Hawaii, forged in fire, shaken by seismic upheavals, and pounded by the sea, is a fabulous paradox of nature. The Hawaiian chain of islands, made up of six main islands plus two smaller ones, stretches for more than 1,500 miles through the heart of the Pacific Ocean. It is a place of idyllic beauty. But it is also a land of volcanic fury, raging mountaintop blizzards, dangerous rockslides, monster waves, and even tsunamis. Kilauea, on the Big Island of Hawaii, provides the most dramatic display of volcanic power. The volcano's newest cone, Pu`u`u`O`o regularly spews molten rock and its steady flow of lava in the past two decades has added more than 500 acres to the island. High above the sea at nearly 14,000 feet is Mauna Kea, which rises above 40 percent of the Earth's atmosphere, making for ideal stargazing. The summit of Mauna Kea is usually barren and dry, but in the winter the crest experiences blizzards with winds that whip up to 70 miles an hour. When a blizzard rages on Mauna Kea, chances are good that down at sea level, it's pouring. Torrential storms are common at
